- a. Steve Stolipher Jefferson County Commission EMS Services He spoke to the Fitch Report and to answer questions. Several models from the Fitch Report were suggested to the Jefferson County Commission (JCC). The county provides paid EMT's and some Fire staff. The ambulances run with paid and volunteer staff. Fitch suggested the JCC purchase ambulances and then bill the departments, but the details are still being worked out.
  - M. Amerikaner the concern is in the average response time, the 90% response time, between now and what the Fitch Report is suggesting. It's a response time difference of 9 minutes to 15 minutes.
  - S. Stolipher the 90% response time takes in anywhere in the county as an average-still working through it. Nothing should change in Shepherdstown. There would be an MOU (Memo of Understanding) with the volunteers to ride the county ambulances. Currently, there are 4 stations that are staffed 24/7 and 1 station (Harpers Ferry) that is staffed for 12 hours.
  - C. Roberts people have real fears of ambulances having to come from afar if Shepherdstown is tied up.
  - H. Frye there is a concern at Shepherd University will Shepherdstown ambulances be called out if others are busy?
  - S. Stolipher in a perfect world, no, but it could happen. The stats show that 3 ambulances cover 97.9% of the county calls, 4 cover 99.95 of the calls, and 5 cover 100% of the calls.
  - H. Frye the Fitch Report is misleading a recent wreck had 4 ambulances on site. In 2020, SU had an ambulance come to campus 20 times.
  - L. Robertson to clarify, what is the number of ambulances Fitch wants the county to go down to?
  - S. Stolipher it has not been determined yet. He would not vote on any less than what we have now.
  - H. Taylor has the Fitch Report taken into account the rise in population?
  - S. Stolipher the county would possible have to buy more if the call volume increases with an increase in population.
  - Fire Chief Morgan A cardiac arrest demands two ambulances. Sharpsburg can help, but Berkeley County won't cross county lines. The JCC and Fitch are all about efficiency and dollars. The fire

departments are all about patient care. The departments are looking at a plan for revenue sharing. Money is there for day-to-day operations, not as profit. Fitch doesn't know how Jefferson County operates Mayor – there is a meeting next Thursday at the fire department that is not open to the public, no decisions are to be made Thursday.

- S. Stolipher to respond to Chief Morgan, all 7 fire departments feel differently. Shepherdstown Fire Department is top notch, one of the best in the state, and is run like a well-oiled machine. Other stations are not run as well.
- M. Amerikaner Jefferson County is projected to grow and the largest age group is 65 and above. Any risk to decrease services to the largest demographic is concerning.
- S. Stolipher Shepherdstown, Ranson, and Harpers Ferry are classified as 'red' areas and will receive max service. Fitch shows where the services need to be.
- C. Heyer what happens when other areas need our help, and why can't other stations recruit like Shepherdstown? Who has the final say?
- S. Stolipher yes, Shepherdstown will help, not sure about the recruitment, and the JCC has final say.
- b. Hali Taylor Shepherdstown Public Library Update and Funding Request

H. Taylor introduced Sally Brasher as a new member of the board. Hali gave a brief history and benefits of the library after its founding in 1922 by the Shepherdstown Women's Club. The library must have a funding authority. In 1970 a funding authority was established and started getting funding from the state. It also gets funding from Shepherdstown and the county, as it's a regional library, serving the region. The library acquired the brownfield off Lowe Drive and raised over \$600K. It was cleaned up and \$3.4 million dollars was raised for the building. The library has not received an increase in funding from the corporation in 9 years, or the county in 7 years. We are in the bottom 5 in local funding, it's at \$6 per capita. We are asking for an increase from \$800 a month to \$1600 a month, snow removal, and mowing as needed.

Mayor – corrected the monthly amount currently given from \$800 to \$900. He suggested this go to the Finance Committee once the driveway is done to have Public Works assess it, and then it would have to become a budget item if recommended.

- J. Haynes is this a one year request?
- H. Taylor no, for a lifetime. It's in the document.
- J. Ford the mandatory funding is not in the document. Have you reached out to the local HOA's for funding as the library serves the region? There are approximately 800 residents in Shepherdstown and they will be paying more than others in the county.
- L. Robertson is there a proposed budget for the new library? That should be submitted.
- H. Taylor yes.

- 3- The proposed use of the Tobacco Warehouse- allows an assignment from the DNR with the Corporation's prior consent. It allows a sub-lease to another entity. For example: if Ascend needs construction parking or added parking. Again, nothing can be implemented without the consent of the Corporation.

J. Ford noted it is written in the lease "removal of access". What does that entail?

C. Printz – they can do that as long as we approve it.

C. Marshall – the sublease – could they sublet to a commercial entity?

Mayor - only with prior town council approval.

C. Stroech - we have absolute control?

C. Printz – yes, we have total control over the property. We are also required to mow and take care of the trash around the boat ramp area.



I have reviewed the letter from the AG's office and the attachments. Even though Shepherdstown did not join in any of the opioid litigation, it appears from my reading of the documents that it may be eligible for some of the abatement funds. The cover letter is not entirely clear whether "participating local governments" include those municipalities which did not litigate. In any event, I recommend that Town Council consider authorizing the Mayor to execute and return both the Local Government Election and Release Form and the MOU within the time provided for doing so. If there are funds available, Shepherdstown cannot qualify unless it returns the signed forms.

Dear Mayor/County Commissioner:

West Virginia has been the epicenter of a national opioid crisis that has ravaged communities and families for over two decades. Numerous lawsuits have been filed by our local communities and by my office against companies in the opioid supply pipeline. I commend our community leaders for taking an active role in seeking to hold these companies accountable for creating this epidemic.

As I am sure you are aware, earlier this year, my office and numerous cities and counties announced the West Virginia First Memorandum of Understanding ("MOU"), which sets out how opioid settlement and judgment dollars from an opioid supply chain participant, like Endo, will be allocated among the State and its communities. Under the MOU, funds are split between abatement, cities and counties, and the State. The MOU creates a nonprofit, non-stock foundation to fund opioid abatement statewide, including in your region. The foundation will be led by talented, experienced health care professionals who will consider the needs of communities all across the state. I am confident that the foundation's work, combined with direct payments to our local governments, will have a meaningful impact on abating the opioid epidemic in West Virginia. I ask that your community support the plan by electing to participate in the MOU. A copy of the MOU is attached for your review, along with a signature page. Our records do not show your local government as represented by counsel relating to opioid litigation; if that information is not correct, please provide this information to your counsel.

More recently, my office announced a \$26 million statewide settlement with opioid manufacturers Endo Health Solutions and Par Pharmaceuticals ("Endo Settlement"). The Endo Settlement is a major milestone for West Virginia and will provide much-needed abatement dollars to communities throughout the state. We now ask for your assistance in finalizing this historic settlement through execution of an election and release form.

Under the settlement, participating local governments who execute an election and release form are eligible for direct payments from the amount set aside for remediation, which is \$23,920,000.00. For the Endo Settlement, 72.5% goes to the West Virginia First Abatement Fund and 24.5%, or \$5,860,400, goes to local governments.

Attached you will find a copy of the Endo Settlement and its exhibits, including a West Virginia Local Government Election and Release form. In order to ensure that your community receives the maximum benefit under the Endo Settlement, please have your council/commission vote on the MOU and the Endo settlement terms and, if your community supports these agreements, please return the executed MOU signature page and the West Virginia Local Government Election and Release Form to my office no later than June 1, 2022 using the following address:

#### WEST VIRGINIA LOCAL GOVERNMENT ELECTION AND RELEASE FORM

This Election and Release Form for West Virginia Participating Local Governments resolves opioid-related Claims against Endo/Par under the terms and conditions set forth in the Endo/Par West Virginia State-Wide Opioid Settlement Agreement executed on March 30, 2022 (the "Agreement"), the provisions of which are here incorporated by reference in their entirety. Upon executing this Election and Release Form, a Participating Local Government agrees that, in exchange for the consideration described in the Agreement, the Participating Local Government is bound by all the terms and conditions of the Agreement. To the extent the Participating Local Government has asserted Claims against Endo/Par in Actions that are pending before the Court, the Participating Local Government hereby grants all necessary right and authority to the West Virginia Attorney General to seek dismissal of the Participating Local Government's Action through the submission of the Consent Judgment as contemplated in the Agreement. If the Participating Local Government's Action is pending in another court as of the Effective Date, the Participating Local Government hereby agrees to dismiss (or if necessary move to dismiss) that Action as to Endo/Par and any other Released Entities within seven (7) business days of the Effective Date.

#### CALL TO ORDER.

The Water and Sanitary Boards meeting was called to order by J. Auxer at 12:32 p.m.

#### 2. <u>MINUTES FROM PRIOR MEETING.</u>

The proposed minutes of the February 23, 2022, regular meeting were reviewed and approved as submitted.

#### VISITORS.

S. Knuppel introduced herself. She works as a Civil Engineer, has resided in the Shepherdstown area for 4 years and is a Water customer.

#### 4. FINANCES. Financial Statements Discussion

- J. Auxer explained that the accounting consultant (Dana Fogle) has estimated that the financial statements will be fully reconciled by the end of May.
- S. Kemnitzer asked what her process was. J. Ford stated that there was no special process but that she has reconciled all the outstanding transactions, whereas some of the transactions had been unreconciled in the past.
- M. Godfrey stated that there are several layers of detail missing from the latest reports that are useful and that we have been used to seeing.
- S. Kemnitzer suggested some format changes that she would find useful.
- J. Auxer suggested that M. Godfrey and S. Kemnitzer send their changes to him and that he would pass them along to D. Fogle at their next meeting. J. Ford suggested that, if possible, M. Godfrey and/or S. Kemnitzer should attend the meeting and present their requests in person.
- S. Kemnitzer asked that we have an agenda item on next month's agenda to have a detailed discussion of the FY 2022/2023 budget.
- M. Godfrey noted that the Water income on the latest reports is significantly above expenses. F. Welch stated that it might not be as it appears since there have been several significant expense items in recent months not shown on the finance report.
- S. Kemnitzer asked if the recent reconciliation had uncovered anything worrisome. J. Ford stated that one worrisome thing came up: the consultant informed us that some accounts had not been reconciled since April of 2021.

#### 5. FLOW AND QUALITY REPORTS.

#### 5.a WATER - NO VIOLATIONS.

C. Coe reported that things were working well in general and that all readings were less than maximum allowable levels.

#### 5.b. <u>SANITARY REPORTS - NO VIOLATIONS.</u>

K. Shipley reported that everything was going well but that the current reports were not available because the lab did not deliver them due to Covid issues.

#### 6. UNFINISHED BUSINESS.

#### 6.a SEWER USE ORDINANCE – REVISION AND COMMENTS - SPRING 2022.

H. Heyser reported that no progress has been made on this effort.

#### 6.b WATER PLANT IMPROVEMENT PROJECT - JEFF EKSTROM TO REPORT,

- C. Coe reported for J. Ekstrom that the project is on schedule. Currently the plant is intermittently running at half capacity so that work can proceed on the idled portion of the plant. To date they have had no difficulty meeting their required output.
- C. Coe reported that the aging plant fence (40+ years) is causing problems. Project has \$13K allocated for repairing sections of the fence that the contractors have had to disassemble but the condition of the fence has made it impossible to repair. C. Coe suggested that we should remove the requirement for the contractor to repair the fence (also remove the \$13K from the contract) and plan to rebuild the entire fence ourselves at an estimated cost of \$31K. J. Bresland and S. Kemnitzer stated that they agreed with that decision and there was no disagreement.
- M. Godfrey stated that he recently toured the plant and was impressed with effort and results of the project.

#### 6.c UPDATE ON WATER DISTRIBUTION PROJECT - JEFF EKSTROM TO REPORT.

- J. Auxer reported in J. Ekstrom's absence. He stated that the \$2Million Congressional grant has been approved. It requires a 25% match from Water, which is currently available from capacity fees.
- S. Knuppel asked if this project was considered maintenance or upgrade. F. Welch responded that it will be mainly upgrade specifically upgrading the capacity delivered to Mecklenburg Heights in order to provide capacity required for fire hydrants.
- S. Kemnitzer asked if there would be any special accounting requirements. J. Auxer stated that we are still waiting to get information as to how to administer the grant.

#### 7. <u>NEW BUSINESS.</u>

## 7.a <u>SHEPHERD VIEW APTS - APPROVAL OF STEP II - HOY SHINGLETON WORKING ON ALTERNATE MAINLINE EXTENSION AGREEMENT - TO BE SENT TO PSC.</u>

F. Welch stated that the Alternate Mainline Extension Agreement is the only outstanding issue, that H. Shingleton had submitted it to the PSC and expects to hear from them in about 1 month.

F. Welch stated that H. Shingleton is preparing to send the Alternate Mainline Extension Agreement to the PSC.

- C. Coe explained that he and M. Godfrey were working together to audit the Lead and Copper Rule project being executed by 120Water. They have a meeting scheduled with the contractor next week to define responsibilities.
- S. Kemnitzer stated that there was a need to inform customers of this project. C. Coe stated that there was a plan to send informative postcards to the customer base.
- M. Godfrey explained that to execute this project we need a GIS tool in order to accurately map the existing system. C. Coe stated that we had solicited bids and, to date, have received only 1 response.
