'Welcome to Shepherdstown': History explored behind new town sign by O'Hurley's General Store


SHEPHERDSTOWN — After beginning to build a new Shepherdstown welcome sign five years ago, O'Hurley's General Store owner Jay Hurley has almost completed it.

This was only part of a project Hurley began several decades ago, to build signs marking every entrance into town.

"It helps to identify," Hurley said. "The reason I started thinking about [doing this project] 30-some years ago — running this store, I would get in my truck and go out and find merchandise. I was driving all over the place, and I would always go through these little towns, and they would have a nice sign."

But Hurley saw that Shepherdstown, in comparison, didn't have any signs, which he believed didn't represent the town's personality correctly.

Many years later, in 2012, the Rotary Club of Shepherdstown proposed building welcome signs for the town, in honor of the town's 250th anniversary. For a number of years after that decision was made, the club worked to build more than one welcome sign, but so far, the only one to be completed was the sign near the Bavarian Inn, which cost almost \$20,000. After that, the project came to a halt.

In spite of that loss in active support for the welcome sign initiative, Hurley said he was determined to continue the project, by building a sign by O'Hurley's General Store. He designed the sign himself, keeping in mind the history of the town.

"I really wanted to do the one on my end of town," Hurley said. "And I wanted each sign to represent that particular part of town. This was the industrial side of town, so I designed mine to speak industry. It has a lot of iron, it's got an iron trust in it, it's got a lot of ironwork, it's got a big, heavy, brick base. In fact, I wanted it to look like old Shepherdstown."

Hurley described the old Shepherdstown buildings as "coming out of the ground as stone, and finished in brick." He also borrowed some architectural designs from other buildings in town, including the soldier brick pattern used on the St. Agnes Catholic Chapel.

"They are vertical bricks laid in as part of the design, as part of the wall, but they're also a pretty interesting design," Hurley said. "So, we did soldier brick on this one, we've got a water table element, we've got chamfered corners, all from different buildings in town."

Hurley presented this design five years ago, and since then has been working on it in his spare time, with the help of a few volunteers. The arch itself took him one year to complete, forging it himself in his blacksmith shop.

Some of the sign's parts even came directly from old buildings that had been demolished over the years. The two pedestals holding the arch up, came from an old factory burned down in the '80s, while a rock from the old railroad station

was placed as a stepping stone up to the grass behind the sign.

"I did for the town," Hurley said. "I'm going to present it to the town council as soon as it's finished, as a contribution to the town."

The only thing left to finish the sign, is the lights, and planting some flowers around its base, according to Hurley.

Addendum to 2022 Christmas in Shepherdstown Parade event request


- 2. **EVENT HISTORY**. There has been a Christmas in Shepherdstown celebration in the town annually since 1988, and the celebration has included a Christmas parade for many of those years. In 2015, when Shepherd University hosted a NCAA Division II playoff football game, the parade's traditional 11:00 a.m. start time exacerbated traffic and parking problems. Therefore, in 2016 we moved the start time of that year's parade up one hour, to 10:00 a.m. The start time has remained there ever since, in large part because it makes it easier for parade entries to participate in both our parade and Charles Town's, which is held in the afternoon of the same day.
- 6. **STREET CLOSURES**. As in previous years, this year's parade route will be limited to the section of German Street between Church and Princess streets. The parade will form up on Church Street, with most of the units in the blocks south of German Street and horses and horsedrawn units in the block between German and High streets. The parade will disperse on Princess Street.

Therefore, we are requesting the following closures:

- 1.) The two + blocks of Church Street between German Street and the town line just south of Washington Street and the block between German and High streets from 8:30 am until approximately 11:00 a.m. (We also ask that the meters in the block between German and Church streets be hooded the night before, with "no parking" signs or cones posted in that area.)
- 2.) German Street, between Church and Princess streets, from 9:30 a.m. until the end of the parade at 11:00 a.m. or so.
- 3.) The block of Princess Street between German and High streets from 10:00 a.m. until 11:00 a.m.

In addition, we are asking that the King Street parking spaces designated for Town Hall business along the McMurran Hall wall across from Town Hall be blocked off the night before with "no parking" signs or cones, so that Welsh Sound can use this area to park its truck and offload sound equipment for the parade.

RE: Garbage and Recycling Rates – Proposed Rate Increases

Proposed Rate Increases:

At a special meeting held July 15, 2022, the Public Works Committee unanimously voted to recommend to Council that all garbage and recycling rates¹ be increased 10% effective upon passage (estimated Jan., 2023) for a one-year period, with proposed 10% increases for the following six years, said proposed increases to be reviewed annually.

Based upon the current rates, these proposed increases are estimated as follows:

Justifications for Proposed Rate Increases:

The Committee considered varying factors and carefully deliberated before recommending the proposed rate increases. These factors include:

*Garbage and recycling rates have not been increased since 2016;

*Due to increasing demand and rising costs, the garbage and recycling services are currently operating on an annual deficit of \$100,000.00. Concerns regarding inflation and long-term strategic planning considerations demand that this fiscal gap should be closed as soon as possible;

*The rates for Apple Valley Waste, the county's private service provider, are higher. For example, residential garbage and recycling service with only one pick-up² per week is currently \$37.72 per month;

*The Committee recognizes the financial impact of these rate increases and decided to propose smaller incremental rate increases over a longer term, rather than an immediate or short-term increase.

¹ Recycling rates are included in the garbage rates.

² Shepherdstown offers two residential garbage pick-ups per week.

THE SHEPHERDSTOWN TOWN COUNCIL ORDAINS:

Section 11-612, of Chapter 6 of Title 11, entitled "Rate Schedule", is hereby amended to provide:

Section 11-612 Rate Schedule

The fee or rate to be imposed by the Town of Shepherdstown upon the users of such service shall be determined by the governing authority of said Town and shall be determined with due deference to the costs of such service to said Town. Users shall be classified as either one family residential, light commercial/office, light commercial/other or heavy commercial and different rates may be prescribed for each class, however, except for special services, rates shall be uniform within each class. Any person or business entity engaged in either the retail or wholesale selling of goods, wares, food, merchandise or services including banks, houses of commerce and insurance houses shall be classified as commercial users. Users having 60 gallons or more of refuse per pick up shall be classified as heavy commercial, users having less than 60 gallons per pick up shall be classified as light commercial. All other users shall be classified as one family residential or light commercial/office. Individual units in multi-family dwellings or apartments are classified as one family residential. Individual units in multi-family dwellings or apartments are classified as the equivalent of one family residential units. All units at one address served by a single water meter that receives a consolidated water bill shall also have bills for garbage service consolidated.

The rates set out in this section shall be for the standard three (3) times a week collection for one family residential or for light commercial users, of which one (1) collection a week will be for recycled material only, and for four (4) times a week for heavy commercial users, of which one (1) collection a week will be for recycled materials only. The rates shall be as follows:

- A. One family residential- \$20.10 per billing period
- B. Light Commercial/Office \$20.10
- C. Light Commercial/ Other \$40.21 per billing period
- D. Heavy Commercial \$200.80 per billing period
- E. (Amended June 8, 1999) Special services to pick up items other than standard items: \$40.00 per pick up for items other than standard pick up truck load; \$80.00 per pick up for items other than standard items for a load larger than a standard pick up truck load, except that the \$40.00 and or \$80.00 charges will be waived during "Clean Up Week" as designated by the Town Council. In addition to the above costs, appliances

containing freon will have a \$50.00 charge per appliance and tires will have a \$2.00 charges per tire. The appliance and tire charges will not be waived.

Harpers Ferry



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Situated at the very tip of West Virginia's Eastern Panhandle, it's hard to overstate the historical significance of this charming settlement, where the past truly seems to live on. Hugging the hillside above the confluence of the Shenandoah and Potomac Rivers, <u>Harpers Ferry</u> is, in equal parts, a living museum and a functioning modern town, all set amid a wild and untamed natural landscape that beckons outdoor adventurers to get out and explore.

<u>Harpers Ferry National Historical Park</u> occupies 3,500 acres—a sizeable plot of protected park land to discover for yourself on foot. But the town's designated <u>Lower Town</u> offers the most immersive and eye-opening place to kick off your trip, with a collection of meticulously preserved 19th-century buildings that welcome you in for hands-on exploration. Start at the Harpers Ferry Visitor Center, where a shuttle bus will bring you straight to the heart of Lower Town, the cultural center of the village.

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found an even more storied place in American history little more than a decade later. In 1859, nearly two years before the outbreak of the Civil War, the abolitionist John Brown launched a campaign to end slavery at Harpers Ferry. Having barricaded himself inside the fort in the waning hours of his crusade, his attempt failed, as he was wounded and captured in this now-infamous fire engine house. Despite this, Brown is thought to have generated an irreversible momentum to the Civil War that ultimately transformed America.

Nearby, <u>Storer College</u> played a significant role in the urgent aftermath of the conflict here. The school, born out of the Civil War, commenced to offer educational and career opportunities to formerly enslaved people. It survived Jim Crow laws and segregation, and was chosen as the site of the second national conference of the Niagara Movement—an African-American intellectual movement—where sociologist and activist W.E.B. Du Bois proclaimed one of America's loftiest calls for civil rights.

October 25, 1783. He was so taken with the view from atop this shale formation—a jaw-dropping vista overlooking the Shenandoah and Potomac Rivers, and the mountainscape beyond—that he wrote fondly of it in his Notes on the State of Virginia documents, stating plainly "This scene is worth a voyage across the Atlantic."

While Jefferson Rock is among the most popular stops for visitors to Harpers Ferry, the park also provides access to a network of over 300 historical Civil War sites—and counting, since historians and park educators are adding to the list all the time. Of course, no visit to Harpers Ferry would be complete without experiencing some of the abundant outdoor adventures that have put this town on the top of so many must-see lists. For travelers of every outdoor activity level and interest, there's truly something here for everyone.

Though it may be one of the oldest towns in West Virginia, dating to 1762, your first impression of Shepherdstown of the buzzing city center will be anything but staid. For a municipality that sits on just 256 acres and has a permanent population of under 1,700 residents (as of the 2020 census), Shepherdstown's offbeat and creative claims to fame are all the more remarkable.

For outdoor adventurers, the <u>C&O Canal</u> towpath offers an ideal backdrop for a range of activities, from walking and kayaking to even distance cycling. The entirety of the C&O Canal runs 184.5 miles between Georgetown in the heart of D.C., and Cumberland, Maryland to the northwest. And with Jefferson County sitting at roughly the midpoint, this section of the recreational trail affords an incredible breadth of options, from short out-and-back explorations

And at the <u>Civil War Center</u> at Shepherd University—a project to establish a Civil War soldier database—visitors can experience a robust library that documents the conflict, along with lectures by leading authorities and battlefield tours, all available by appointment. And at <u>Historic Shepherdstown & Museum</u>, you can browse exhibits from the town's history or take a self-guided walking tour through the historic district

With its own fully operational blacksmith shop right onsite, you may feel you've been transported through time—but don't worry, the store has all the modern conveniences you could wish to stock up on while in town.

Charles Town

Last but certainly not least among the charming hubs of Jefferson County is the home of its own county seat, Charles Town. Originally founded in 1786, Charles Washington (yes, of those Washingtons—he was the youngest brother of Founding Father and first President George) once donated the land at the intersection of George Street and Washington Street for public use. Today, Charles Town seamlessly blends the past and present with rich history all



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
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Among the most historical destinations here, kick off your visit with a stop at <u>Happy Retreat</u>. This Federal/Greek Revival-style estate was once home to Charles Washington, and today the classical structure is the site of the non-profit Friends of Happy Retreat (FOHR), which maintains a center for history, heritage tourism, scholarship, culture and events.

Nearby, the Washington Heritage Trail spans 136 miles of Eastern Panhandle mountainscape. Charles Town and Shepherdstown have both preserved historic character along their sections of the trail, inviting visitors to experience a taste of life as it once was in Colonial, Revolutionary and Civil War-era times.

The Jefferson County Courthouse was built in 1836 and, while still in use today, it is most well-known for its role in the trial and execution of famed abolitionist, John Brown. His trial, which took place at this very courthouse, was among the most famous in American history. There's also the Jefferson County Museum, home to a permanent collection along with various exhibits that feature a variety of Civil War items and relics, along with objects from John Brown's trial. And at just over 5.8 square miles in size, Charles Town makes it easy to see and do it all in one short getaway.
